In the Persian fable which forms the basis for Iranian playwright Bahram Beyza'ie's play, four people build a scarecrow for protection, only to have it come to life and dominate them. Modern Times' adaptation adds a contemporary Canadian sensibility while retaining the play's allegorical structure.

Working within a rigorously antinaturalistic form which employs elements of dance, clowning and puppetry, the company brings the fable refreshingly to life. Athletic, physically demanding choreography and wildly percussive live music by Baha Sadr combine to portray emotions ranging from bravado to terror in a way that is both haunting and darkly funny.

Movement and dance are used as effective substitutes for dialogue, and there is a bright sense of characterization and much satiric humour in the exchanges between the characters—each of whom represents a different social group.

The actors all show a verve for the physical comedy. Peter Farbridge is particularly good as the hapless downgrougen, his rubbery face and body bouncing from manic to sardonic and back.
